IoT Security Concerns and Challenges

What are the concerns

Platte County Email Scam

The Platte County Treasurer's office fell victim to a Business Email Compromise (BEC) just before the Memorial weekend. The email came from what staff thought was a legitimate internal account belonging to the Platte County Presiding Commissioner. The email tricked staff into sending a wire transfer of \$48,220 to the cyber criminal's bank. Although officials were able to stop more than half of the transfer from going through this is a good lesson in security awareness training and having incident response plans in place.

How to avoid these types of cyber crimes

Do not open attachments from unknown senders. JCCC has systems in place to flag email that comes from outside senders that impersonating a JCCC email address. Look for the heading "Suspicious Sender" in the subject line. Never provide passwords in an email.
