Please do not use flash photography during the performance, as it may startle the actors ... and as we all know, a startled actor is a dangerous thing. In fact, please help us stay out of copyright jail — photographs are forbidden altogether.

If you must chew gum or suck on candy, unwrap your goodie before the lights go out.

Please do not talk during the performance. Laugh, cry, guffaw, weep, sniffle, chuckle or gasp instead. We like those things.

Feet belong on the floor, not on the seats or rails in front of you.

A word about children: In consideration of other audience members, we ask you not to bring children age 12 or younger to any of our productions (except for the children's play). Please ask the house manager if you have questions regarding the play's content.

If you are a friend or family member of a cast or crew member, we invite you to meet with them in the lobby following the performance.

Zero. That is the number of dollars budgeted for The Green Works Project . But where some might see an obstacle, the creative teams of the GWP see only opportunities. Zero waste. Zero negative impact on the environment. Zero cost

Directors were entrusted with choosing scripts knowing that they could only produce them using elements already on campus. The design teams (set, costumes, light, and sound) then were tasked with creating designs that could be pulled from existing stock inventories. Nothing is built—only re-used or re-purposed. Including the playbills!

Sustainable productions align the Theatre Department with JCCC's Center for Sustainability's mission of being environmentally, socially and economically responsible. They also prepare students for the reality of working within the scope of any budget while also aspiring to create positive change within the world of theatre.

When the The Green Works Project closes, the production will be dismantled and returned to storage. The Project's footprint will be minuscule, but the impact on students and audiences will be meaningful.

When lonesco attempted a self-taught English language program in the 1940s, he was startled by how banal, uncommunicative, and absurd the phrases he was learning were. And what he called a 'tragedy of language' became the basis for his first play. Set in a bourgeois English household, the comedy displays the bizarre and comic disintegration of language and communication. The title is thought to have originated from a verbal slip-up by an actor during the original rehearsal period. Since 1957 it has been in permanent showing at the Théâtre de la Huchette in Paris. It holds the world record for the play that has been staged continuously in the same theatre for the longest time.

The possibility of words from different speakers intersecting in a way that truly matches their intentions has about the same chance that two comets, hurtling on wildly different trajectories, have of colliding in the middle of space"- (David Ives). In both plays, the dilemma of finding connection through communication is explored: whether it be from one human to another or finding humanity itself. Is it possible the wit, romance and glory of words can take away our loneliness, or even make us into actual human beings?
