### **New Students**

New students must complete an attendance interview. To request an interview, visit the CLEAR webpage and click the "Request a New Student Interview" button or call the manager, Catie Marx, at 913-469-7890. Enrollment may be submitted prior to interview on a provisional basis.

#### **Fee Payment**

The registration fee is a flat \$20 per semester. Fees can be paid by cash, check or money order in the Supported Education office (COM 220) or by credit/debit card or e-check via the Marketplace portal. Fees must be paid by the first day of classes. Refund requests must be received at least four days prior to the start of classes.

#### **Electronic Enrollment Information**

Electronic enrollment is the preferred method of enrollment. Visit the CLEAR webpage, Expansion tab. Click the blue box "Electronic Registration for Spring 2025" and follow the instructions. Fees must be paid at the time of enrollment in the Marketplace portal. You will receive an emailed receipt as proof of enrollment. Electronic enrollment closes December 15, 2024.

You may return the paper enrollment form via email or mail. Paper forms should only be used if you cannot access the electronic form or if paying with cash, check or money order.
