CPR/AED Training Session

It's a fact – cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) saves lives. Along with this, correct use of an automated external defibrillator (AED) used during an emergency can save a life, too. AEDs are located in every building.

American Heart Association Heartsaver CPR/AED is a 3-hour, single-session classroom course that teaches basic CPR and AED skills such as:

- Giving CPR to a child (age 1 or above) or an adult
- Using an AED
- Using a mask or barrier device

The course provides employee training for:

- Designated first responders/BELs/Police Department
- Individuals needing credentialed training for job or regulatory requirements
- Select departments or an entire workplace

During the course, an American Heart Association (AHA) instructor conducts lessons and works with students to complete their CPR and AED skills practice and testing. The AHA Heartsaver CPR/AED course completion card is valid for two years.

Stop the Bleed

A 1.5-hour course consisting of educational PowerPoint presentation and hands-on learning. It is designed to teach anyone how to correctly apply a tourniquet and to hold pressure on a bleeding wound.

Encouraged for BELs and open to all employees.

Today we live in a world where the actions of unstable people and the dangerous impulses of others are very real and becoming increasingly more frequent.

Massive bleeding from any cause where a response is delayed can result in death. Similar to how the general public learns and performs CPR, the public must learn proper bleeding control techniques, including how to use their hands, dressings and tourniquets. Victims can quickly die from uncontrolled bleeding within five to 10 minutes.

Take this important time to attend this training being offered here at JCCC.
