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The University of Kansas Entry-Level Doctorate in Occupational Therapy degree program is consistently ranked among the top programs in the nation, KUMC OTE trains leaders in occupational therapy.

- The University of Kansas Entry-Level Doctorate in Occupational Therapy degree program is a full-time, three-year course of study located on the KU Medical Center; it includes academic coursework, fieldwork education, and doctoral experiential components.
- This program has been designed to provide students with skills necessary to work as an Occupational Therapist in a range of possible settings. Upon completion of this course of study, students will be eligible for the national OT certification examination.
- Applicants must possess a cumulative grade-point average (GPA) of at least a 3.2 on a 4.0 scale for his or her bachelor's degree program and specifically a 3.0 GPA on all prerequisite course requirements. The information documented on student transcripts will be used to calculate all grade point averages. Consistent with University of Kansas policy, the admissions committee will replace grades of classes that have been repeated. AP courses and grades are not considered for prerequisite requirements.
- A background check is required during the admission process; it may affect the student's eligibility to enter the program. This one-time fee must be paid directly to the company performing the background investigation. More information: School of Health Professions background check policy.
- As part of the online application, applicants will submit a personal statement describing why occupational therapy is their chosen career, and how a degree in OT will support the applicant's personal and professional goals. This statement should include an explanation of how personal, professional, and educational background and experience has prepared the applicant for this career decision and a future in occupational therapy.
- All applicants must submit three separate references are required and should be written by a professional, advisor, instructor, supervisor, coach or other adult contact who can attest to the applicant's potential success in the program and future contributions to the occupational therapy profession.
- All accepted students must submit copies of current, valid CPR certification prior to the program start date and maintain certification while in the program. Students need to complete the **Basic Life Support** for Healthcare Providers training through the American Heart Association.
- In addition, student must provide proof of current health insurance coverage before entering the program.
- Applicants who have been convicted of a felony should be aware of the fact that application for licensure, certification, or registration will be subject to review and additional information may be requested. Based on the review process, denial of licensure, certification, and/or registration may occur and subsequent opportunities for employment may be compromised.

It is the STUDENT'S RESPONSIBILITY to check for updates to all transfer information. This transfer guide is provided as a service and is updated as needed. Degree requirements at the four-year colleges are subject to change by those institutions. To ensure you have the most accurate up to date information about the program, it is imperative you meet with an advisor at the transfer institution.

Students must also complete a Bachelor's degree of their choosing. Students completing the Bachelor's degree from KU must complete the KU Core Requirements. Students that complete the A.A. at JCCC meet the KU Core Goals 1-3.

KU Core Requirements comprise three general education goals and three advanced education goals. The general education goals are best met early in a student's career. The advanced education goals are most appropriately acquired using the foundation of knowledge gained from the general education goals and progression through the Bachelor's degree major. The table below indicates which KU Core goals are met by completing the Occupational Therapy Doctorate Prerequisites.
